

Electoral Reform in Canada



William Cross, Hon. Dick & Ruth Bell Chair for the Study of Canadian Parliamentary Democracy, Carleton University. As a student of comparative political institutions, his work emphasizes the connections between civil society, political parties and legislatures. Recent publications include studies of intra-party democracy, changing methods of party leadership selection and Australian and New Zealand political parties. Dr. Cross is Past-President of the Canadian Political Science Association and previously served as Director of Research for the New Brunswick Commission on Legislative Democracy.



Don Desserud, Professor, Political Science, University of Prince Edward Island. From 1989 to 2011, he taught at the University of New Brunswick (Saint John), where he was also Associate Dean of Graduate Studies (2007-2010) and Director of the Urban and Community Studies Institute (2010-2011). His current research focuses on Canadian parliamentary conventions and procedures. He has published articles on such topics as the confidence convention, prorogation, and the constitutional limits on Senate reform. Dr. Desserud also studies and publishes on New Brunswick and PEI politics.



Joanna Everitt, Professor, Political Science, Dean of the Faculty of Arts, UNB (Saint John); former Visiting Fellow, Women & Public Policy Program, Harvard University Kennedy School of Government. She specializes in Canadian politics, gender and politics, and political behavior. Her research examines gender and politics including differences in political participation, public opinion, and media coverage of party leaders. Recent work explores similar questions for LGB politicians. Lead investigator for the 2014 New Brunswick Election Study and part of scholarly team that produced the 2004-08 Canadian Election Studies.
